The MacInnes Family of Musquodoboit, Halifax County, Nova Scotia

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(A 4g grandson of Miles MacInnes)

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Lieut. Miles MacInnes was a native of the Isle of Skye, Scotland. He emigrated to North Carolina in 1774, fought for the British during the American Revolution, was taken prisoner at the Battle of Moore's Creek Bridge and eventually was awarded compensation from the British, including 200 acres at Meaghers Grant on the Musquodoboit River in Halifax County, Nova Scotia in 1784. Miles married Christiana MacDonald in Halifax in 1789, daughter of Capt. Angus MacDonald, a native of Benbecula who had also served in the same regiment in North Carolina. This is a record of their descendants.

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First Generation

1. Miles MacInnes. Born ca 1754 in Camucross, Sleat, Isle of Skye, Scotland. Miles died in Meaghers Grant, NS, in 1818; he was 64. Residence: North Carolina (1774), Halifax (1784).

Lieut. Miles MacInnes, by Flo Dickey, Tucson, AZ. Some of Flo's text came from "Highlanders from Skye, in North Carolina and in Nova Scotia: 1771-1818", By Robert Archibald Logan, Scottish Genealogist, 1966, Vol. 12(4): 92-108.

Miles MacInnes departed from the Isle of Skye, Scotland to North Carolina in 1774. It has been said that he was born at Camucross, Sleat, Isle of Skye. It is also possible that he was born at North Uist. It is very possible that he was a son or close relative of John MacInnes (MacGinnis) who was the boatman for Flora MacDonald and Bonnie Prince Charlie, but I have not found any documentation to prove any of the above as yet.

Miles arrived in North Carolina in 1774 with enough money to purchase livestock and operate a plantation of 1800 acres in Anson County, North Carolina. He grew apples, peaches, wheat, corn, rye, and oats. He raised cattle, horses, sheep, and hogs. The nearest villages were Cross Creek and Campbelltown (which were merged about 1778 under the name of Campbell-town, which was then changed to Fayetteville in 1783). Miles probably purchased goods from this village. It was a thriving trade center with mills, pharmacy, courthouse, hotel, and general store.

Miles was appointed a lieutenant by his regiment leader Colonel Hector McNeil. He served under Captain Allen MacDonald, who was commander of the Anson Battalion that was in the battle of Moore's Creek Bridge. Miles future father-in-law, Captain Angus MacDonald and Angus's son, Angus, also served in this battalion.

When the North Carolina governor called up the Highland settlers of his Province, he expected that they would march about one hundred miles to the sea-coast where British ships would arrive to transport them to Nova Scotia and they would be given training and arms in order to defend their country against rebels. But this was not the case. Before the Highlanders reached the coast of North Carolina they met a smaller and much better armed body of Yankee rebels. Unfortunately for these Highlanders, less than half were armed and those classed as "armed" had nothing other than swords. The battle took place at Moore's Creek Bridge February 27, 1776. In the brief battle Highlanders were outmaneuvered by the highly skilled Americans. A few were killed and more than 800 taken prisoners. Included among the prisoners were Allen MacDonald of Kingsburgh and his two sons, our Capt. Angus MacDonald, and our Lieut. Miles MacInnes. Since there were so many prisoners and not nearly enough Yankees to guard them, the younger men were released. They were told to go home and think about joining the Yankee cause.

Some of the Highland prisoners escaped.

Miles MacInnes was among those captured. He was carried to the Cross Creek jail where he was "loaded with irons and suffered many cruelties." When word came of the approach of a large British force, the rebels removed his chains and he made his escape to the British Army.

Miles MacInnes continued to serve as a lieutenant in the British forces under Colonel Ray. He served on active duty in the Carolinas, Georgia, and Florida, until 1783. For the last few months of his military service, he was in St. Augustine, Florida.

Miles' property was confiscated. After the war he went to London to present his claims for losses suffered in North Carolina arriving December 9, 1783. He had excellent references and letters of recommendation from high officials, but things moved slowly. In late summer 1784, (nearly a year later) he was awarded about 45% of his losses and given permission to emigrate to Nova Scotia, where he had friends and connections. His old unit and the 84th Royal Highland Emigrant Regiment had been sent there a few years earlier and mustered out at Windsor, Nova Scotia at the end of the war. The soldiers were given land in Nova Scotia provided they stayed.

After the deportation of the French Acadians, the British offered free land and vacant farms in Nova Scotia to anyone willing to settle. Many New Englanders, including our Dickeys and other groups from Scotland, the British Isles, and German states along the Rhine came to settle. Two hundred Scots settled at Pictou, Nova Scotia in 1773 from the ship Hector. They were the first of a vast wave of Highlanders who crossed the Atlantic seeking a better life. These Highlanders settled mainly on Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island.

In 1775, when the Revolution broke out in America, it seemed likely that Nova Scotia would join the other thirteen colonies. This did not happen. It remained a Crown Colony and thus Nova Scotia became one of the main receiving points for the flood of Loyalists who fled the new United States after the war. In all, about 30,000 people settled in Nova Scotia mainly along the Atlantic Coast. The arrival of so many people, some of them very influential, transformed Nova Scotia into a busy Crown Colony.

Miles MacInnes was a single man when he arrived in Halifax, Nova Scotia in the autumn of 1784. He was awarded 200 pounds sterling for his property losses in North Carolina, he received "half-pay" for one year, and a pension of 20 pounds per annum from 1783 to 1790, when the amount was reduced to 16 pounds sterling per annum. The Pension Rolls show that he was paid until 1818 and from that date the pension was paid to his widow, Christiana MacDonald MacInnes.


Miles was promised 200 acres on the Musquodoboit River as soon as it could be surveyed, but he had to wait until December 1785 before that was done. Miles and two other loyalists named Daniel Blue and Andrew Murphy, were the first three white settlers on that part of the Musquodoboit River. This area is located above the rapids (falls) that are located about two and a half miles from the mouth of the river.

A settlement had been started in 1784 on the headwaters of the Musquodoboit River by men from Truro and Onslow by way of the Stewiacke River and that settlement extended downstream. But Miles and his companions were the first white settlers to come into the Musquodoboit Valley from the Atlantic Coast and extend the settlement northward.

This settlement on the Musquodoboit River was made up of Scottish North Carolinians. It was a nucleus of ten men, four women, and two children who settled there as early as May of 1784. Most of the men had served in the Militia and were from Cumberland and Anson County, North Carolina. Miles MacInnes was one of these Musquodoboit settlers.

The grant of land which Miles was to settle was stony, uncultivated, and full of underbrush, but fertile. When they

first went in, they had to cut roads around three waterfalls. Miles and his party missed the distribution of food and tools which the provincial government made to the loyalists and during the first year they had to eat their seed potatoes. By the time they got more from Halifax the following year the season was to far advanced for a successful crop. Miles said the only communication with Halifax was by water and that was hazardous most of the year.

Even though Miles built a log house on this land, he found the land unsuitable for farming and tried to obtain another grant of land farther up the river. Unfortunately, all the good land had been already granted to others, particularly a large area granted to Martin Meagher. Meagher's Grant was a grant of land comprising about 9000 acres near Halifax. For the purpose of colonization, this land was granted to "Bachelor Meagher" a Major in the British Army in 1765. It is documented that Ranald MacDonald, one of the first settlers came from the United States. Ranald was born on the Isle of Skye, a loyalist and believed to be the son of Flora MacDonald. Archibald Crawford, another early settler, married Mary MacDonald, daughter of Angus MacDonald and sister of Christiana who married Miles MacInnes. Another early settler was John Dunbrack, a Scotchman, who married Catherine MacDonald and her brother, Alexander MacDougall married Catherine MacDonald, another sister of Christiana MacDonald.

About 1790, Miles purchased some land a few miles up stream from where he first settled on a farm known as the Parker Place (owned in 1980 by Fulton Dunbrack) and a few years later moved to a farm where he resided for the remainder of his life. Miles' son, Malcolm remained in the home and raised a family of sixteen. It was eventually sold to Wellington Kent, then to a Dr. Wilson, and in 1980 to Robert Misiner. It is on Lay Lake Road and just west of where the Lower Meagher's Grant school was located in 1987. His neighbors included Angus MacDonald, Archibald Crawford, Jacob Bayer (Byer), a son of George Bayer, Sr. formerly of Frankfurt on-the-Main, Germany, James Cruickshank, and John Dunbrack to name a few.

The first time Miles MacInnes saw his wife was when he and some other officers were on a trip to McNabb's Island and unexpectedly came on the three MacDonald girls while bathing.

On September 19, 1789, Miles MacInnes married Christiana in St. Paul's Church in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Two of Christiana's sisters were married to neighbors of Miles; her sister Mary became the wife of Archibald Crawford and her sister Alexandrina, better known as "Lexy," became the wife of Jacob Bayer. A third sister Catherine married Alexander MacDougall.

In 1810, Miles MacInnes signed as a witness to the Will of Alexander Mackenzie, Lake Egmont, Halifax County, N.S. The other witness was to the Will were Ranald MacDonald and James MacDonald.

Miles MacInnes was instrumental in getting a road from Meagher's Grant to Halifax. He became a Justice of the Peace and was a prominent citizen of the district. In 1814, he and Archibald Crawford applied for Crown Land on West River St. Mary's, where they hoped to raise cattle. Each was to receive a grant of 500 acres, but before the land could be granted Miles MacInnes died and the land reverted to the government.

Miles died in 1818 and Christiana died in 1853 at the age of 84. Miles MacInnes apparently died without a Will. For no stated reason, the estate was not settled until about 1834, when part of his land at Meagher's Grant was conveyed by a deed to his son Malcolm. The deed was signed by the other heirs. Other nearby land was conveyed to his son Angus. The names of the female heirs were:

Miles MacInnes and Christiana MacDonald MacInnes had 9 children who produced at least 60 grandchildren all who lived to be adults and had large families. Their descendants are now widely scattered over Canada and the United States and have included men and women who became lawyers, doctors, educators, bankers, engineers, explorers, publishers, military officers, nurses and writers.

**** In all documents signed by Miles MacInnes the surname is spelled MacInnes. In deeds signed by his heirs in 1834 the name appears as MacInness. In a map of Halifax County showing names of householders about 1860 the name appears as McGinnes and as McGinness. In some books, such as "Historical and Genealogical Record of the First Settlers of Colchester County" by Thomas Miller, the name appears as McInnis.

**** In a story about the early settlers of Meagher's Grant by A.B. Lay, he stated that when ever you hear the name MacInnes you will find carpenters. It has been said of Malcolm MacInnes that he could build a mill with a square, saw and broad axe."

To the Honorable Commissioners appointed by Act of Parliament for inquiring into the Losses and Services of the American Loyalist - - -

The Memorial of Miles McInnes Lieut. of the North Carolina Militia-Humbly Showeth;

That your Memorialist was appointed a Lieut. In the Regiment of Militia under Colonel Hector McNeil in North Carolina in the year 1780, did duty as such till being out on a scouting party nigh the Cheraws was, with several others, taken prisoner and carried to Cross Creek jail, where he was loaded with Irons, & suffered many cruelties;

That the Rebels getting Intelligence that the British Troops were advanced nigh Cross Creek, took off his Irons & your Memorialist by the Help of some friends made his Escape to the British Army, where he acted Lieutenant as formerly under Colonel Ray, and proceeded with him to Wilmington, after the Evacuation of which Place he went with the British Troops to Charlestown, and from thence to St. Augustine, where he was continued in the same Office, till Peace was concluded;

That your Memorialist received at Charles Town a Twelve months Half pay and no more by Order of General Leslie for the Time of his Loyalty; That your Memorialist by his absence was deprived of all his Effects, both personal and real in America as p Schedule hereunto annexed & no Means or Calling being left him of Support was necessitated to come over into England, where he arrived the 8th Inst. And resides now in London without Friends or Money in great want of the Necessaries of Life, therefore prays that his Case may be taken into your Consideration, in Order that he may be enabled, under your Report, to receive such Aid or Relief as his Losses and Services may be deemed to deserve & Your Memorialist will ever pray.

Went from Scotland in the year 1774 to settle in America - he had heard talk of the Rebellion before he left Scotland - he bought a Plantation in North Carolina for £100 currency - upon his arrival he had 114 Guineas when he landed - when he bought it there were 14 acres cleared - he cleared 29 more - he thinks with his Buildings & Improvements it was worth £200 currency - he had cattle, Horses & Hogs with the corn at his plantation worth £200 Currency.

He was at Moores Bridge under Col. McDonald but made his Escape & remained at his own plantation untill 1780, much alarmed - the Oath was often tendered to him but he always refused it, he served from 1780 to the Evacuation of Charlestown as Lieutenant of Militia - this is certified by Col. McNeal, Capt Alex. McRae, Lieut. Col. Hamilton & Brigr. Gen. Mc Arthur & to property from Col. McDonald, Col. Cotton & major Mc Leod - is a single man & has no means of Subsistance.

Decision £20 p. Annum

This Man appears to have be well attached to the Cause of Great Britain & to have lost his property in Consequence thereof - he is in great want of support & having produced the necessary Certificates both as to Loyalty & Property from Col. McNeal, Brigr.Gen. McArthur and other Officers We think ourselves justified in recommending an allowance of £20 p. Annum from Michaelnas last 1783.

Miles McInnes late of Anson County, North Carolina, Farmer, but now of (Musquodoboit) Musquadobbit in the County of Halifax, maketh oath and saith, that after the conclusion of the late American War, the Deponent put in his claim for losses, as a Loyal Suffering Subject, from Carolina aforesaid, Before the Honorable the Commissioners for American Claims, Lincoln's Inn, London and was thereupon allowed as a Temporary Subsistence, the sum of Twenty pounds sterling per annum, That in the fall of the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty four this deponent arrived at Halifax, Nova Scotia, and there received from His Excellency Governor Parr, a grant of land Situate on the East side of the River, at Musquadobbit aforesaid, containing Two

hundred of acres of rude and uncultivated land, but did not get any Tools, or Utensils therewith. That the Deponent has at much expense and with much Care, pains and Labour, Built a Logg House, on part of said land, made some Improvement thereon, by planting potatoes, garden Seeds etc. That the Deponent resides on his said land and intends so to do, and that he has not, nor has any one in trust for him, any other property in Nova Scotia, but the land and Improvements aforesaid. And this Deponent further saith, That until the Deponent and a few more Individuals, settled on the said River at Musquadobbit, there were no Inhabitants on the said River, and the same Lands were never before settled by white people, which made and still makes, the settling of said Lands, attended with very much difficulty, Labour and Expense, there being no road to Halifax from thence, the only communication being by water, which during the Winter, is either rendered impracticable, or attended with great risque, so that the Cultivation of said Lands, under these, and many more inconveniences, such as the length of the Winter, the difficulty of clearing the land, which tho: fertile, when once cleared, yet in its Natural state is a mere Wilderness, full of underbrush, and exceedingly stony, which requires great exertions of Industry, and much Cost to remove, And this Deponent also saith That if the said Allowance of Twenty pounds per annum, shall be discontinued to the Deponent, it will very much distress him in his present State and Situation.

Sworn before me this forth Day of May 1787 Geo. Wm. Sherlock J.P.

A Representation of the present state & Circumstances of Miles McInnes.

That on my arrival in this Country, I made application to his Excellency Governor Parr who was pleased to Order me 200 acres of Land on the river Musquidoboit in 1784; but could not have it laid out to me until the year following, by reason of me, not being able to do any thing of Consequence for myself, and consequently at more expene than my circumstances would well allow: As soon as possible after my Land was Surveyed I built a house, and entered upon Clearing the Land for Cultivation: That a Mr. Blue a hlaf Pay Officer, another Family and myself were the first Settlers on the above said River which is not Inhabited to the distance, by computation of 45 or 50 Miles being navigable for boats after having passed 3 falls which lies within about 2 1/2 miles of the Tide, and round which falls we had (on our first settling there) to cut out Roads, and to encounter many other difficulties, which from the nature of the Country & Inclemency of the Climate is easier Conceived than for me to describe, there being no Communication with Halifax but by sea, Passages often Attended with a considerable loss of time, every Species of Provisions & Cloathing dear, the necessary Seeds of all kinds at a very high rate & sometimes very difficult to procure: That particularly last season from the extreme inclemency of the preceding winter, Seed potatoes, which is a principal dependence of new settlers here; was extravagently dear & which from want of an easy Communication with Halifax I could not procure untill the Season was too far Advanced which was a Considerable detriment to me. Thee Coroborating inconveniences however Trivial they may appear, has realy Exhausted all my little stock insomuch that if the Commissrs. Will not be pleased to continue me my yearly Allowance, or I receive a dividend Shortly in despight of my Industry I shall be unable to prosecute my present Plan of Subsistence.

On 19 Sep 1789 when Miles was 35, he married **Christiana MacDonald**, daughter of **Angus (VIII) MacDonald** (-1802) & **Catherine MacLeod** (1731-1813), in Halifax, NS. Born in 1769 in Isle of Skye, Scotland. Christiana died in Meaghers Grant, NS, in 1853; she was 84. Residence: North Carolina (1773), Halifax (1778).

Christiana was the daughter of Angus MacDonald the VIII of Griminish, North Uist and Catherine MacLeod, the daughter of the Rev. Donald MacLeod of Skye and Ann MacLean of Boreray. Christiana was born on the Isle of Skye in 1769. She was about five years old when she went with her family to North Carolina in 1773.

After the American Revolution the family settled in Nova Scotia and on September 19, 1789 Christiana married Lieut. Miles MacInnes in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Christiana's father, Captain Angus R. MacDonald the VIII of Griminish was a descendant of Hugh (Uisduin) Alexander, First of Sleat and his third wife, the daughter of MacLeod of Harris. Christiana's mother, Catherine MacLeod was born about 1731 in Skye and died 1813 in Nova Scotia. Christiana's lineage goes back to Somerled through John, First Lord of the Isles and both of his wives, Amy MacRuari and Priness Margaret Ross Stewart.

The first time Miles MacInnes saw his wife was when he and some other officers were on a trip to McNabb's Island and unexpectedly came on the three MacDonald girls while bathing. Christiana and Miles were married in Halifax, Nova Scotia on September 19, 1789. Miles MacInnes died in 1818 and Christiana died in 1853 at the age of 84. From the Nova Scotian, a newspaper clipping said:

"At Musquodoboit, aged 84 years, Mrs. MacInnes, widow of Mr. MacInnes, an officer of the British Navy. She was born on the Isle of Skye and arrived in America before the war of independence. After the Revolution she came to Nova Scotia and married and has left behind her a numerous family of children, grandchildren and great grand children...."

Their descendants are now widely scattered over Canada and the United States and have included men and women who became lawyers, doctors, educators, bankers, engineers, explorers, publishers, military officers, nurses and writers.

All of the ancestry of Christiana MacDonald, which includes Kings of both Scotland and England and many Barons and Knights, has come from Flo Dickey, the Burkes and Scots Peerages, and the Clan website genealogies for Clan MacDonald, Clan MacLean, Clan MacLeod and Clan MacFarlane.²

He was married twice, first to Susan Arichibald, the daughter of David Archibald and Elizabeth Kent. She died and left no children. Angus married Miss Reynolds. Little is known of any descendants from this marriage (Flo Dickey).

Appendix 1: Angus MacDonald and Catherine MacLeod

1. Angus (VIII) MacDonald, son of **John (VII) MacDonald** & **Ann MacDonald**. Born in Griminish, North Uist, Scotland. Angus (VIII) died in Meaghers Grant, NS in 1802.

Angus MacDonald, VIII of Griminish of Scotland, North Carolina & Nova Scotia by Flo Dickey, Tucson, AZ

Angus and his brother Archibald, the sons of John MacDonald, VII of Griminish and Ann MacDonald of Balivqueen, appear about the same time as 'on record as of Griminish and Scolpig'.

Tradition tells that Angus of Griminish, evidently on his succeeding his father, was hoodwinked into a scheme of emigration by several of the North Uist gentlemen, who pretended that they were to cross the seas to America.

Angus is said to have been masterful and domineering and his neighbors devised this somewhat dubious plan to get him out of the country. Be this as it may, Angus alone made genuine preparations for the voyage to America while the others kept up the deception to the very end by sending packing cases laden with peats and other similar contents to the port of embarkation.

At first, Angus was taken in by this ruse; but afterwards, when it was too late he sailed for the new world. Angus, having given up the tenure of Griminish for the new world, his brother Archibald came into possession as tacksman of Griminish.

A poem by John MacCodum, the North Uist poet, bemoans the emigration. But the poem states that Angus was a man of considerable wealth, nobility and much stature in North Uist.

Angus was living in Griminish prior to his father's death in 1765 and was then on record as Angus of Griminish. One could assume that Angus went to America after his father's death in 1765. It is said he did not find a congenial home in the new world and returned to Scotland before 1769. However circumstances change and he returned to America and settled in North Carolina with his wife and some of his children in December 1773. Angus was married when he went to America the first time and his wife, Catherine stayed with her parent's family on the Isle of Skye during his absence as three of their daughters were born on the Isle of Skye; Mary born 1767 and Christiania "Christy" born 1769 and Catherine born 1773.

In the later part of 1773, Angus and his family set sail for North Carolina and arrived in December of 1773. Also on the same voyage in 1773 were three young neighbors and cousins of Angus' from Knockline in North Uist. They were Marion, Janet, and Augus, children of Donald MacDonald. These young people came over as servents to pay for their passage. They were just a few of the many Highlanders that left their homeland for the new world. The following story relates the reasons for this move.

In 1746, following the Battle of Culloden, the Parliament of Britain passed some harsh laws to abolish the Highland Clans. The use of the tartans and the wearing of kilts were prohibited. These measures were endorsed by the occupying army. Local government thereafter was to be by Government appointed officials. No Highlander was allowed to own any arms. All this meant was that the clan chief would have no further use for the tacksmen except as tenants. A clan could survive only so long as the chief adhered to the ancient principles and they all had a perfectly valid legal right to lay those principles aside and rent the land for the best price it would bring. Sooner or later every clan chief adopted the new order of things. The tacksmen did not like it. They were as equally determined to emigrate rather than accept the new law.

This is what happened in the case of our Skye and Uist MacDonalds. In 1746 Sir Alexander of Sleat, the Chief,

died the same year of the new laws. His oldest son, James, was a minor. Old Kingsburg was his tutor. James was given a good education, and when he took over the reins, he had not the remotest idea of doing differently from the long established custom. Every clansmen loved him and it was reciprocal. But Sir James died in 1766 at the age of 26 and unmarried. The next in line to inherit the chiefship was the next brother, Alexander. He had been educated in London, and perhaps no thought had been given to the possibility that he might some day be chief. He began to rent his land for the best price he could get regardless of kinship. As rapidly as leases expired the tacksmen were to pay higher rents or leave and leave they did. There was propaganda widely circulated that greatly hurt the pride of the tacksmen, to the effect that they were robbing the chiefs with one hand and the poor people with the other. Dr. Johnson discusses this at length in "The Tour of the Hebrides."

In 1759 a regiment was raised on the estates of Sir James MacDonald, and led by Montgomery, a brother of the mother of Sir James. In order to enlist the Highlanders, Prime Minister William Pitt decided to allow them to organize pure Highland regiments and permit them to wear kilts and be led by their own officers. Fourteen hundred men volunteered and officers were commissioned. They first saw action in New York and Pennsylvania and by 1761 a report came in that the Cherokees were molesting the western Carolinas. Montgomery, with 700 of these men, went to the Carolinas for about a year. Returning north they were discharged at the end of the French and Indian War of 1763. They were offered free land if they wanted to settle in America, or passage if they wanted to go home. But this group of MacDonald men returned to Skye and Uist. Naturally these men would learn a lot about the country during their stay in the Carolinas and tell about it back in Skye.

In 1771, James MacDonald of Heisker, Hugh "One-eye" MacDonald of Armadale, and several other MacDonalds applied for a grant of 40,000 acres of public land in North Carolina for themselves and their families.

In 1772, Hugh was back in North Carolina and bought land on Mountain Creek and returned to Skye and was there in October 1773 to ferry Johnson and Boswell to Mull and returned to North Carolina in 1774 to build a grist mill for the new settlers. In other words the clan was about to move its place of abode, and as Johnson expresses it, carry along their kindred, their customs, their language, etc. and "change nothing but their place of abode and of that they see the advantage."

In December 1773, Angus, his wife Catherine and five children arrived in North Carolina and settled immediately on land transferred to him by Alexander MacDonald, 5th of Cuidreach. In the later part of 1774, arrivals from Skye included Flora MacDonald and her husband, Alan MacDonald of Kingsburgh, their sons, Alexander, and James and their daughter Anne and her husband, Alexander MacLeod of Dunvegan, Isle of Skye; also Donald MacDonald son of Alexander MacDonald, 5th of Cuidreach and Miles MacInnes. Three young neighbors of Angus, from Knockline in North Uist came on the same passage with Angus to America in 1773. They were Marion and Janet daughters of Angus MacDonald and their cousin Augus, son of Donald MacDonald a relative. These young people came over as servents to pay for their passage.

Angus MacDonald had purchased several other tracts of land and by the time the Highlanders were mobilized at Cross Creek in February, 1776, he owned a total of 1861 acres. He received a commission as Captain from the governor of North Carolina and was in command of his company when taken prisoner at Moore's Creek Bridge, February 27, 1776.

Miles MacInnes, Flora MacDonald, her husband Allen of Kingsburgh, their sons Alexander and James, a daughter Ann and son in law Alexander MacLeod, Donald MacDonald (son of Alexander 5th of Cuidreach) all arrived in Anson County in 1774, most likely on the ship "Cato" arrived from Scotland carrying 312 Highlanders, in December of 1774, all from the Isle of Skye (Port of Brunswick Record Book). They settled in the Cape Fear basin where their relatives had settled a year earlier.

The nearest villages were Cross Creek and Campbelltown, which were merged about 1778 under the name of Campbelltown which was changed to Fayetteville in 1783.

Soon after their arrival trouble began in New England between the British and the American colonies. Two Scottish officers of the British Army were sent to North Carolina to organize a regiment of Highlanders to help support the British cause. They were Major Donald MacDonald and Captain Donald MacLeod, cousins of our descendants in North Carolina.

Many of the Scottish settlers in North Carolina were born in America or had become Americanized and favored the Yankee cause. Some wanted to remain neutral as they knew the treatment they or their parents had received from the English troops in Scotland when they had gone against the English government in the Rising of 1745. Those who arrived only a few years before 1775 were not free to make a choice as they had taken an oath of loyality prior to their arrival in America. These newly arrived Scots, our ancestors, had lost so much in Scotland, they did not want to risk losing all their possessions in this new homeland. Most of the newcomers still had family back in Skye and feared reprisals if they supported the Yankee cause.

The British Government was well aware of this and tried to round up all the Highland men and transport them to known loyal territory as soon as possible, before they could be persuaded to join the Yankees. It was for this reason that Major Donald MacDonald and Captain Donald MacLeod were sent to North Carolina. Flora MacDonald, having gone against the British before in helping Bonnie Prince Charles, knew exactly what the repercussions would be. Consequently she was very willing to support the British and help persuade her family and friends to do so as well. Soon Major MacDonald, Captain MacLeod and about 1500 men began marching to the sea coast where they expected to be taken by ship to Halifax, Nova Scotia for training and arms, then return to Anson County to fight the Yankees. They joined the Highland Emigrant Regiment and they wore their tartans and kilts with pride. Unfortunately for these Highlanders, less than half were armed and those classed as "armed" had nothing other than swords. They were met by a smaller but well armed force of Yankees at a place known as Moore's Creek Bridge February 27, 1776. In the brief battle, Highlanders were outmaneuvered by the highly skilled Americans. Some were killed, including Captain Angus's son, and more than half taken prisoner. Included among the prisoners were Allen MacDonald of Kingsburgh and his two sons, Captain Angus MacDonald, and Lieut. Miles MacInnes. Since there were so many prisoners and not nearly enough Yankees to guard them, the younger men were released. They were told to go home and think about joining the Yankee cause. Some of the Highland prisoners escaped.

On October 28, 1785, in London, England, Captain Angus MacDonald submitted his claim to the Commission appointed by the British Government to settle claims of American Loyalists.

His claim stated that he had resided in North Carolina from December, 1773, until he was taken prisoner by the enemy in February of 1776. He took an active part in the uprising of Highlanders at Cross Creek and was taken prisoner February 27, 1776. He remained a prisoner over two years. After being released he rejoined the British forces and served until "the Peace.." He submitted a "Schedule" of property losses in North Carolina; lost when his possessions were taken or destroyed by the Americans. Angus claimed the loss of 5 tracts of land, each of which was operated as a plantation complete with buildings, horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, tools, and equipment. Two of the plantations were equipped with grist mills. The land areas were all in Cumberland County, in the vicinity of Cranes Creek, which is northwest of Fayetteville. The different tracts had areas of 400, 300, 250, 256, and 655 acres, for a total area of 1861 acres. Angus also claimed the loss of 94 sheep, 10 horses, 70 hogs, and 39 cattle. Several of his plantation were rented to tenants.

On October 28, 1785 his case was heard in London. In sworn testimony, he stated that he arrived in North Carolina in December, 1773 and settled at Cranes Creek in February of 1774. After being captured he was kept in close confinement for a year and was then let out on parole. After his release, he joined the British Army in Philadelphia in 1777. He obtained a lieutenancy in the PIONEERS AND GUIDES in 1778. He was at the siege of Charleston, and later Captain in the NORTH CAROLINA HIGHLANDERS and continued with them until the peace. He went from New York to North Carolina to rescue his wife and five children, who had lived on his home estate until they were forced to flee, without any possessions, in 1781.

From North Carolina, Angus took his family to Nova Scotia, where they lived until he started his voyage to England to try to recover his losses. Angus arrived in London a few days before the hearings, October 20, 1785. The evidence of the hearings shows that he produced a conveyance, dated 1 April 1774, for four tracts of land totaling 400 acres purchased from Alexander MacDonald. Alexander MacDonald of Cuidreach, on the Isle of Skye, was married to a half sister of Flora MacDonald. She was a daughter of Flora's mother and her second husband, Captain "One-eyed" Hugh MacDonald. Angus stated that when he arrived in North Carolina he carried over 300 guineas, a draft for 1340 guineas, and goods and possessions having a total value of about 700 pounds sterling. He could not produce deeds for the other tracts of land because they had been left in "the office" in North Carolina but he gave the following information;

300 acre tract purchased from a man named Cameron, 1774

250 acre tract purchased from a man named Gilmore, March or April of 1775

256 acre tract purchased from a man named Matthews, May 1775.

655 acre tract purchased from a man named Bowie.

He claimed loss of crops totalling 1000 bushels of indian-corn and 150 bushels of wheat. In 1781, his wife and children were forced to leave home without even a "second shift."

A supporting witness to these claims was Captain Alexander Morrison who had known both Captain Alexander and Captain Angus MacDonald in Scotland and North Carolina. He lived eight or nine miles from Angus, in North Carolina. He was with them when they made the bargain for the land at Cranes Creek. He said that Angus MacDonald was a man of good character and had brought property into the country.

Another witness, Donald Shaw (son in law of Morrison), had known Angus in America and before, and spoke highly of him.

There is nothing in the file to show when a decision was made about the property losses, but there is a document showing the following:

Captain Angus MacDonald waited in London for four months without receiving payment. Angus had given his tenure of Griminish to his brother Archibald before leaving for America. Some time during the waiting period in London, Angus returned to his native Uist. However, he did not go back to his ancestors in Griminish, but resided at Balranald, then occupied by his kinsman, Donald MacDonald.

He presented another claim on or soon after, February 17, 1786 asking that some form of aid or temporary support be given him until he "might receive compensation for his lost property," and he gave the following reasons;

He had served in the rebellion in America and his wife and family had been forced to remain in the hands of the enemy who plundered them of their effects and confiscated all his estate.

Before the evacuation of New York (November, 1783) he returned to North Carolina for his family and took them to Nova Scotia "where they are now" and with whom he had remained until he came to England to have his claim heard. Since his arrival in England, he had been examined by the Commissioners for the Loyalist Claims, his claim

"amounting in Carolina currency to 3393-17 pounds, equal in Sterling to about 1936-6-4." He had to refurnish his family with clothing, household furniture, and equipment; to purchase tools for farming; "to build a house in the wilderness" and, this, exhausted all his finances and involved him greatly in debt, he having no resources other than his half-pay, and "what is still a greater sting to his feelings as a husband, and a father, that for want of means, he is unable to go back to his family."

Josiah Martin, who had been governor of North Carolina when Angus lived there, was then in London. He wrote a letter, dated 17 February 1786, supporting the Memorial and recommending that "a temporary aid, or subsistence, be awarded to Captain Angus MacDonald to enable him to return to his family in Nova Scotia."

Captain Angus was called for a hearing on February 25, 1786. In the record of that hearing, the following information can be found:

He went to North Carolina, December 1773.

He raised a company of 250 men and joined Major Donald MacDonald's forces by order of Governor Josiah Martin. He had two commissions of Captain; one from Governor Martin and one from Lord Cornwallis. He had half pay as Captain.

After the peace, he went to Nova Scotia with his wife and children.

He came to England in October 1785.

His case was heard October 28, 1785, Loss of 1939 pounds Sterling, Intends to return to Nova Scotia at first opportunity.

The Commissioners evidently thought it better to send him back home to Nova Scotia than to pay his support in London until his claim was paid. The decision was to pay him 25 pounds "to defray the expense of his return to Nova Scotia."

It is assumed that he returned as soon as possible and that the compensation for property losses was paid to him after his return to Nova Scotia. Of all the American loyalists named MacDonald who submitted claims to the British government for property losses in North Carolina, Captain Angus MacDonald was the one who received the largest amount of compensation. With all his land, he probably had slaves but, unlike some of his neighboring claimants, he did not submit any claim to the British government for the loss of slaves. It is probable that when he went back to North Carolina, to rescue his wife and children, he also rescued some of his slaves and took them to Nova Scotia, with the family. This would explain the story in Nova Scotia that he brought his wife and family, and slaves to that country.

Angus and his family settled in Kennetcook, Hants County, Nova Scotia. For some reason they spent a lot of time on MacNabb's Island, according to an article written, August 10, 1901, by J.D. Bayer, a great grand son of Angus. Bayer states that his great grandfather Angus came to Nova Scotia from Florida, where he had a plantation of some size and a dozen slaves. That they originally came from the Isle of Skye and his great grandmother was married after the celebrated Flora MacDonald who was married to Allan MacDonald of Kingsburg.

One must remember that a lot of people in Nova Scotia thought of the eastern sea coast of the United States as one giant Florida and then Miles was in Florida prior to Nova Scotia may be the source of this statement. Flora married Alan of Kingsburg Nov.6, 1750, did Bayer mean that his great grand parents married after that date?

Captain Angus MacDonald married Catherine MacLeod, the daughter of the Rev. Donald MacLeod III of Greshornish (1698-1759), Skye and Ann MacLean, the daughter of the Rev. John Maclean the second son of John MacLean, 8th of Boreray. The Rev. Donald MacLeod III of Greshornish served as a missionary to the Island of Benbecula, in 1736 to North Uist and 1754 to Duirinish on Skye. He spent most of his ministry in the Outer Hebrides.

Captain Angus MacDonald and Catherine MacLeod had several children;

- 1. Donald, born in North Uist (c.1750), was alive in 1795 and living in North Uist at that time.
- 2. Angus, born in North Uist, married Margaret Buchanan. He died in the Battle of Moore's Creek Bridge or shortly thereafter of wounds.
- 3. Alexander, born in North Uist, died in Nova Scotia.
- 4. Mary, born about 1767 on the Isle of Skye, married Archibald Crawford of Nova Scotia.⁴
- 5. CHRISTIANIA "Christy" born about 1769 on the Isle of Skye, married MILES MacINNES of Skye, North Carolina and Nova Scotia. (Bayer said he remembered hearing that the first time Captain Miles MacInnes saw his wife was when he and some other officers were on a trip to MacNabb's Island and unexpectedly came upon the three MacDonald girls bathing.)
- 6. Alexanderina "Lexy" married Jacob Bayer, Nova Scotia.
- 7. Catherine born ca. 1773, married Alexander MacDougal, Nova Scotia.

After the marriage of Christy to Miles MacInnes, Captain Angus MacDonald moved to Meagher's Grant. The old cellar of his house could be seen in 1910. Each of the MacDonald girls received two slaves. Tom Wade of Windsor Junction is a son of one of the girls given to Christy MacInnes, Black Charlotte. The other one also named Charlotte, married a former southern slave named Dennis McGruda.

Charlotte lived in a small log cabin on the MacInnes' farm, and one night when Dennis came a courting, the MacInnes boys crept up to the shanty to listen. Dennis first knelt down and said a long prayer after which he managed to pop the momentous question, and in a very short time Mr. MacInnes, who was a Justice of the Peace, had to perform the marriage ceremony for the happy couple.

Dennis McGruda got to Nova Scotia by guiding the British to a Yankee stronghold in the war of 1812. The British found him at work for his master and compelled him to show them where the enemy was by promising him his freedom. They were good as their word, and that's how Dennis McGruda got to Nova Scotia.

Captain Angus MacDonald received half pay of Captain till 1813.

***From Moore County Court Minutes of February 22, 1785:

"Thomas Matthews came into court and on oath returned the following articles of the estate of Angus MacDonald liable for confiscation to wit: 200 acres of land, 9 pounds and 15 shillings, one surveyors chain, 2 head of cattle and one horse in the hands of Thomas Collins."

**** Moore County Court Minutes of August 21, 1792:

"A Letter of Attorney from Anguish McDaniel to Ferquard Campbell was duly proved before Samuel Ashe, Esq. one of the judges of the Superior Court and Ordered to be registered."

It would therefore appear that Captain Angus MacDonald, then in Nova Scotia, had some hopes of recovering at least a part of his property. The foregoing claim is quite different in form from those filed by others of the Highlanders. Whereas other claims are submitted with certificates from officers who were captured at Moore's

Creek, Capt. MacDonald produced only two, one from Dr. Morrison; the other from Donald Shaw, (Dr. Morrison's son in law) and these only mildly certified to his loyalty and scarcely at all to his property. The entire claim is confused and one can hardly tell just how much property he lost. The 400 acre tract referred to was sold to him by Alexander MacDonald of Mt. Pleasant, North Carolina, and the deed is recorded in Fayetteville. The other deeds referred to as having been left "in the office" are not of record. The 400 acres mentioned lay on, and is believed to include the mouth of Little Crane's Creek where it enters Big Crane's Creek, just below the railroad between Cameron and Vass. The mill mentioned was originally built by Thomas Gilmore, and at one time known as the Keith, Muckle and Stokes's Mill. In the early days of the Raleigh and Agusta Air Line, this place was a flag-stop, and was known as Walnut Grove. A few of these trees still grow in the vicinity.

Ca 1750 Angus (VIII) married **Catherine MacLeod**, daughter of **Rev. Donald MacLeod III** (1698-27 Dec 1759) & **Ann MacLean** (-25 Dec 1774), in Isle Of Skye. Born in 1731 in Isle Of Skye, Scotland. Catherine died in Meaghers Grant, NS, in 1813; she was 82.

Catherine's grandfather was the Rev. John MacLean, the second son John MacLean, VIII of Boreray and Mary MacDonald of Morar, who was the daughter of Alexander MacDonald, 6th of Morar and Anne MacDonald of Sleat. Her other set of grandparents were Alexander MacLeod III of Greshornish, Skye the son of Norman MacLeod, 2nd of Greshornish and Catherine MacLean of Coll.

They had the following children:

- Donald. Born ca 1750 in North Uist, Scotland. Donald died in North Uist, aft 1795; he was 45.
- ii. Angus. Born in North Uist. Angus died in Battle Of Moore's Creek Bridge.
- iii. Alexander. Born in North Uist, Scotland. Alexander died in Nova Scotia.
- iv. Mary. Born in 1767 in Isle Of Skye. Mary died in Nova Scotia.

Mary married Archibald Crawford.

That Mary was married to Archibald Crawford came from Flo Dickey's notes, perhaps from the 1901 article by J. D. Bayer she referred to, but this is from Jennie Reid's Musquodoboit Pioneers, Early Settlers in Meagher's Grant, A.B.Lay 1922. (updated to 1980). "Meagher's Grant was a grant of land comprising about 9000 acres, made to "Bachelor Meagher", a Major in the British Army in 1765, for purposes of colonization. Roland McDonald, one of the first settlers came here from the United States in 1777. He was one of the many Loyalists who settled in Nova Scotia about that time. - v. **Christiana** (1769-1853), married to Miles MacInnes.
- vi. **Alexandrina** ("**Lexy**"). Born in 1770. Alexandrina ("Lexy") married **Jacob Bayer**, son of Hans Georg Bayer⁵ (1727-3 Feb 1802) & Eva Cathrine Rouche (1733-22 Mar 1811).

In the Halifax City Directory 1912 to around 1934 it stated that Bayers Road commenced at Oxford Street and ran west to Dutch Village Road. From 1934 onward, it stated that Bayers Road commenced at Windsor Street and ran west to Dutch Village Road. Today Bayers Road still commences at Windsor Street and rans west to Joseph Howe Drive, formerly called Dutch Village Road. Bayers Road was called after a German settler who had the last name of

Born in 1767. Jacob died in 1830; he was 63. They had the following children:

- a. Ranald Bayers (1797-). Ranald married Ann/Nancy MacInnes (2), daughter of Miles MacInnes (ca 1754-1818) & Christiana MacDonald (1769-1853). Born on 24 Dec 1790. 1875 census Hennepin, MN Dickey Bayer 32 b. NS Barbary 28 b. NS Anna 9 b. NS Idda 7 b. NS L.M. 0 b. Minn Bayer Anna 84 b. NS (Bayer Dickey would be her nephew).
- b. **Duncan**. Born in 1802. Duncan died in Musquodoboit Harbour, NS, on 18 Nov 1875; he was 73. On 9 Jan 1828 when Duncan was 26, he married Mary Crawford in Musquodoboit, Halifax Co., NS. Born on 28 Sep 1808. Mary died in Musquodoboit Harbour, NS, on 10 Nov 1898; she was 90.
- c. James A. Born in 1808 in Bayer Settlement, Musquodoboit Harbour, NS. James A. died in Meaghers Grant, Hfx. Co., NS, on 30 Apr 1890; he was 82. On 13 Feb 1834

Bayer and who owned a considerable amount of property in the area. His grandson, Thomas Bayer built a house on Bayers Road. Thomas Bayer built his picturesque homestead in 1838 on the north side of Bayers Road, about eight hundred feet west of Oxford Street. The east and west wings were later added to the house. Many large trees stood in front of the house, which was formally separated from the road by a low stone wall topped by a neat picket fence. The house was destroyed by fire November 1939.

The narrow dirt road that ran in front of his old homestead, taking the early settlers from the Dutch Village to and from Halifax, was later known as Bayers Road. Not many motorist who travel this main road are aware of the rich history in the area. Today 2021, construction to widen the paved road has recently been completed, allowing the busy traffic to flow smoother. The original 94 acre property was granted to Col. Frederick Hamilton but he sold it to George Bayer on Feb. 6, 1764 and George later added another 80 acres to his property. George Bayer (Bayers, Beyer) emigrated from Rotterdam, Germany on board the Pearl in 1751 and landed in Halifax. He started a bakery which became quite successful. He obtained a contract to supply the many ships on station with soft bread and he also supplied the troops posted in Halifax at that time.

The original George Bayers farm was located on the west side of Windsor Road (Windsor Street) on the outskirts of the town's settlement. The original house he lived in was built in 1765 and contained part of an older log cabin built by Colonel Hamilton and to which an addition was added to its northeast end. It was located some four hundred yards north of the present day Bayers Road at a place called "The Willows" about 493 yards north of Young Street. The house burnt down about 1867.

When George Bayer died, the 176 acre property passed on to his second son, Phillip, who was a trapper and trader in furs with the Mi'Kmaq and who lived in the old house at "The Willows." His only son John, died before his father and after Philip's death about 1838-39, the property was divided into two parts, the original homestead and north section going to his elder grandson, John, who married a daughter of the well-known Titus Smith and whose son was Rufus Bayer.

The southern part became the property of his other grandson Thomas, who built the picturesque farmhouse on Bayers Road. The Middle Peninsular Blockhouse, one of the town's forts that was used as a defence against the Mi'Kmaq, was located on the Bayers property near the corner of present day Connaught Ave. and Bayers Road. The foundation of the blockhouse was still seen in 1848 in the hollow below Philip Bayers pasture.

Notes regarding George Bayer:

George was born in 1727 and died in 1802. He married Eva Catherine Rouche birth unknown, and who died in 1811.

Their children were:

- 1. George Bayer, born 1755 and died in 1829 in Petpeswick, Halifax County. He married Elizabeth Martin.
- 2. Catherine Bayer, died unknown.
- 3. Eustina Bayer, died unknown. She married Duncan Clarke.
- 4. Jacob Bayer, died unknown. He married Elizabeth Simonds (and 2nd Alexandrina MacDonald).
- 5. Philip Bayers, born about 1758 and died 1833. He married Mary Stayner.
- 6. John Bayer, born 1761 and died 1840. He married Sarah Webber.
- 7. William Bayer, born after 1761 and died 1810. He married Elizabeth Cochran.

- when James A. was 26, he married **Isabel Shaw**, daughter of **Alexander Shaw** (1 Dec 1774-9 Jan 1867) & **Isabel Mason** (20 May 1785-), in Meaghers Grant, Hfx. Co., NS. Born on 16 Aug 1809. Isabel died in Meaghers Grant, Hfx. Co., NS, on 16 Jul 1882; she was 72. James A. was the father of James Duncan (J.D.) Bayer, who apparently wrote a history of the Bayer/MacDonald families in 1901.
- d. **Edmund Harris**. Born on 15 May 1814 in Musquodoboit Harbour, NS. Edmund Harris died in Dartmouth, N.S., on 2 Mar 1872; he was 57. On 30 Jun 1843 when Edmund Harris was 29, he married **Abigail Doggett Verge** in Porters Lake, NS. Born on 12 Sep 1822 in Porters Lake, NS. Abigail Doggett died in Dartmouth, N.S., on 3 Apr 1871; she was 48.

On 11 Aug 1886 when Miles was 66, he second married **Mary Robertson** in Greene, Tennessee. Born in 1843 in Greene, Tennessee. Mary died in Greene, Tennessee, on 22 Jun 1922; she was 79.
- vii. Catherine (ca 1773-). Born ca 1773. Buried in Pioneer Cemetery, Middle Musquodoboit, NS.

In 1789 when Catherine was 16, she married **Alexander MacDougal**, son of John MacDougal. Born in 1765. Alexander died on 30 Aug 1834; he was 69. Buried in Pioneer Cemetery, Middle Musquodoboit, NS.

Alexander MacDougall, b. Scotland 1765, received two grants, one at Meaghers Grant and one at Little River (Elderbank). He brought his parents to live on the second grant. Alexander had two brothers, whom may have gone to Ontario, and sisters Catherine, m. to John Dunbrack, Sarah, m. to Mr. McIntosh, Mr. Bacon, and John Dunbrack after the death of Catherine, and Margaret, m. to Christopher Dillman. Alexander m. Catherine MacDonald of Kennetcook, and had children John, m. to Nancy MacInnes, Alexander, m. to Hannah Dickey and Phoebe Hamilton, Daniel (1794-1802), Elizabeth, m. Hon. Wm. McKeen, Isabel, Hugh Alexander, Catherine, m. David Dickey, Dougall, m. Mary Parker, Janet. m. Benjamin Smith, William, Nancy, m. David Fisher, and Grace, m. James Bruce. This information from Flo Dickey, Tucson, AZ.

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
